Six + 1 Writing Traits

1 Idea

The content, the message, the story.

It's interesting. Has details. Show me, don't tell me.

Good stories can start with simple ideas, like a chair.



Six + 1 Writing Traits

2 Organisation

The structure. Good paragraphs.

The writing has order. There is a start, middle and end.

The story moves. There is flow. It is connected.



Six + 1 Writing Traits

3 Voice

Your ideas are in the writing. Not just copying sentence patterns.

Your opinions.

Your unique style.



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4 Word choice

Good words. Not boring words.

Paint a picture with words.

5 Sentence Fluency

Use a variety of sentences. Long. Short.
Different structures.

Good sentences are like musical notes. They
have a beat and rhythm.

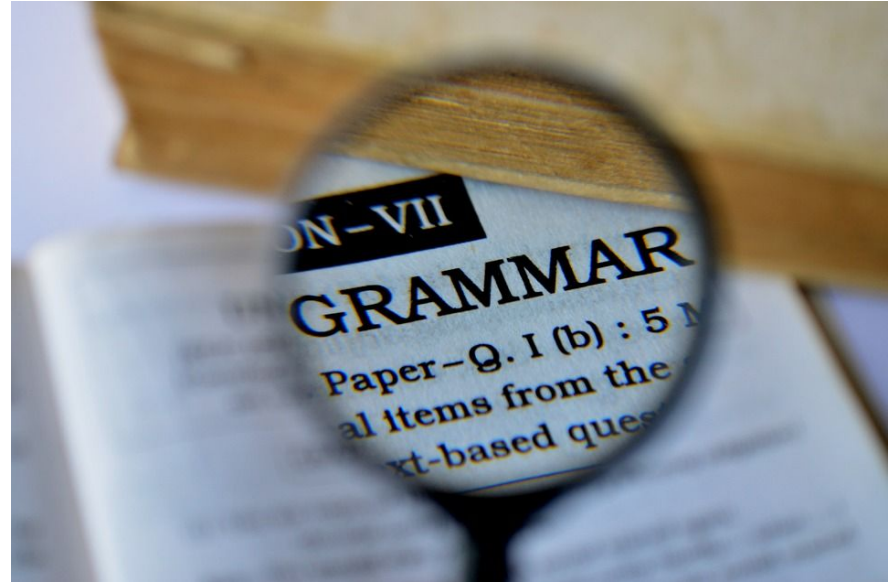


Six + 1 Writing Traits

6 Conventions

Spelling, grammar, punctuation, capitalization.

Important,, but good writing is more than proper grammar.



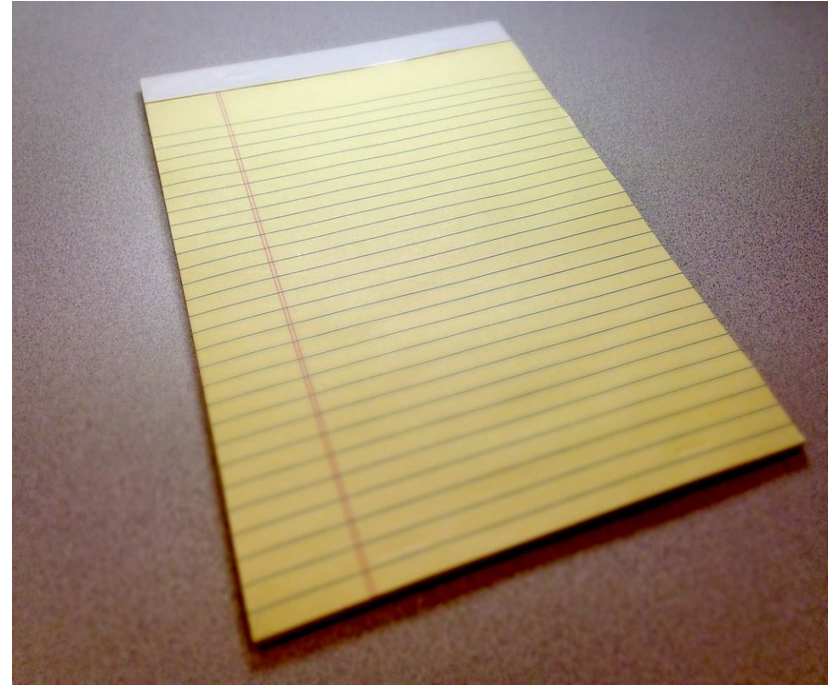
Six + 1 Writing Traits

The way your writing looks on paper.

Must look good. Lots of white space. Easy to read.

Neat.



The Writing Traits



Ideas...

the content, theme, and message



Organization...

the structure of your writing



Voice...

the personal tone that brings your writing to life



Word Choice...

the vocabulary used to convey meaning



Sentence Fluency...

the rhythm and flow of your writing



Conventions...

the correct spelling, punctuation, capitalization, and grammar



Presentation...

the overall look of your writing
